MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON 7 NOVEMBER 2013 AT THRINGSTONE **COMMUNITY CENTRE**

Discussions/Decisions

Monthly litter total for October including community litter pick -Monthly litter pick total for October was 167 bags of litter removed.

Thank you to the 7 adults and one young lady for helping with the litter pick on 19 October. We collected 14 bags of rubbish, which, given much of the village is cleared daily by the group, is still a lot to collect in a couple of hours. The back road down to the George and Dragon was particularly strewn with litter. Thanks to Ron for taking that one on for us.

Photos were taken and have been added to the portfolio, sent to the webmaster and put on the Litter Action UK site.

The young lady who came along got a certificate of thanks from Community Services Volunteers, as October was part of their campaign called Make A Difference.

Thanks also go to Thringstone Co-op for letting us have supplies of their bags for a lifetime for our litter picking activities.

We were invited by NWLDC to a **cream tea for volunteers** who do litter picking on 31st October. Ron, David and Nita attended and certificates were given out at the cream tea. Nita was also presented with a special recognition award for her work litter picking in the village.

Expenses - from last month's meeting. Geoff Wilson chaired a discussion regarding the provision of **broadband** for the group, which currently is provided by the Chair. When mobile calls are made by the chair, which are outside the current package, the chair will claim on the expenses procedure for this. The issue revolved around the need for the group to have access to and be contacted using broadband. After considerable discussion, the meeting voted that the chair be reimbursed 50% of the cost of the broadband. This will be repaid by sending the book keeper/treasurer copy invoices monthly.

This requires someone with excel and **an hour a month** to do the necessary computer entries etc. This is not something that Nita can or will take on. Nita is already chair, secretary, minute secretary, what's on co-ordinator, publications writer and publicity officer, environment lead and history researcher. If anybody is willing to give an hour a month to help the group, please contact Nita direct.

Village Quiz at the Community Centre – this is taking place on 8 November starting at 7.30pm. The team is David Stevenson, Gillian and Des Bates, Rowena Summers, Geoff Wilson and Robert Jordan.

Carols Round The Tree – 20 December at Thringstone House Community Centre, with procession from St Andrew's.. Leon has secured a free tree of about 20 feet from the source mentioned at the last meeting. This is being picked up shortly by Bernard. Some members agreed to help him with this. Leon was thanked for his help.

Big Book of Thringstone – history. This mammoth work, which took over a year to research and write, was sent to the printers last month. They are doing the proof reading and resetting the script in publisher. They wanted to have a contents page, which has been provided, but also have a wish to see a detailed index listing people, occupations, organizations and places.

There are many people listed in various categories, and it would be a mammoth task to undertake to do an index. An example is Moses Burton who appears in the category on stockingers (framework knitters), in the poverty section and also in others. We also listed many people who had 'run ins' with the law and putting in every person would mean an index of several pages. The meeting voted against having an index at all, and this will be passed back to the printers. The book will be bound, so with a hard cover. The cost of binding the book will work out, for 50 copies, at just under £2 per book plus the printing costs. It is proposed that the book is 15.9 wide and 22.5 deep which is known to printers as SRA.

Chair's report

History report

- We have been investigating the names of the **overseers for the poor of Thringstone**, a post which linked to the Board of Guardians and also to, in the case of our village, Ashby Union Workhouse. Linked to this, we are also looking to find names of **parish constables** also appointed by Ashby Magistrates for our village and Grace Dieu. This research is bringing up a host of new information.
- We have added some more wedding photographs of people in the village to our archives.
- We carried out a series of interviews with the granddaughter of Lizzie Waldrum nee Upton who started the chip shop in the village which became **Ruby's.** She has let us scan photographs of the family and other relevant items, including the chip shop takings book from 1927-34 and rent book payments, for which we thank her. Copies of all these have been run off to go into our archive folders. Some of the photographs are of Ruby Waldrum herself, and we also have obituaries for Ruby's parents and a photo of Jack (Ruddy) Waldrum and Lizzie his wife. They were Ruby's parents and started the fish and chip shop in 1895.
- Ron Hill gave us some information on pubs, which included a photo of a group of **licensed** victuallers from the district taken approximately in the 1950s. We are now trying to find names for these gents.
- Ann is continuing to get the **WW1 project information** sorted in the agreed format.
- On 21 November at 10.30am til 12 noon at Snibston is a meet the experts talk on **remembering the fallen of WW1.** Pre-book on 278444.

County Council 'Financial Crisis' consultation

I reported to you previously that Leicestershire County Council have been consulting on how we deal with the £110 million revenue shortfall we will be facing over the next few years. Over 7,000 people responded (mostly in the older age range) to the consultation and the areas which residents highlighted as those best for making savings are:

There was also discussion about the **cycling network** running through Coalville, and why this did not link up to the Sustrans route, and about a small area near the fencing to Harlow's which is about 2 metres in length and seems to serve no purpose.

Council Tip

Coalville Tip is now closed on Thursdays and Fridays. The opening times from October until March are 9am – 4pm on remaining days.

Council Tax Fraud Campaign

NWLDC are in the process of conducting a review of Council Tax 'single person discounts' over the coming weeks.

The review is one carried out by all councils on a periodic basis to address the problem of fraudulently claimed single person discounts, believed by professionals to be one of the most common types of fraud committed.

If you claim single person discount you will receive a letter over the coming weeks, if you have not already done so, asking you to self certify your continued entitlement.

Please fill in and return the letter promptly to ensure an uninterrupted award of your discount.

Dog Waste

According to council officers we are now in dog waste 'peak season' and for the next few months the level of inconvenience caused by the problem will almost inevitably increase.

Using limited resources NWLDC are trying to address the problem, although officers concede prosecutions are notoriously difficult to secure.

One of the ways the matter can be addressed is by highlighting the problem and to that end I have been issued with a dog fouling warning stencil kit.

If there is anywhere in the village which you feel is particularly inconvenienced by dog waste please let me know and I will come along with my pavement stencilling kit.

At this point in time there was discussion about whether it would be feasible for McDonalds in Coalville to do as other towns have done and put the registration number of vehicles on people's drive through receipts so that if this were discarded outside a bin, the culprit could be traced. This had been discussed with NWLDC and their legal department had suggested there were too many potential loopholes for this to be considered.

Thringstone Parish Council

We have previously discussed the pressures that our village will increasingly face as a result of County Council spending cuts (highlighted by the LCC MTFS Consultation above) and reductions to budgets available for the Coalville Special Expenses at NWLDC (well over £30,000 taking into account recharged expenditure next year).

We have also discussed the possibilities for moving forward, one option being the establishment of a Parish Council.

In order to formally consider establishing a Parish Council the most common method of starting the process is by way of a petition calling for a Community Governance Review.

Following discussions, I have now compiled such a petition compliant with the legal requirements. To trigger a review our petition needs to get 250 signatures, although good practice would suggest we get 30 or so more. All signatories MUST live in Thringstone.

Please sign the petition in order that the formal process of considering the establishment of a parish council may commence.

Aside from the above Dave and I have been undertaking casework throughout the ward.

Police Report

- 2 x shed break ins where lawn mowers were taken under investigation
- 1 x theft from Co-op under investigation
- 3 x other thefts under investigation
- 2 x damage filed
- 1 x assault detected
- 3 x domestic incidents.

Other incidents which we know about, due to emails from the Police appealing for information but not identified in the crime stats provided by them are:

2 cars in Glebe Road had **catalytic converters** taken from them which were reported in emails from the police in early October asking for information. There has also been at least one stolen on Melrose Road and a spate of this in Whitwick. We understand that there is a specialist 'Op' in place with covert patrols to try and find out who is responsible for these converter thefts. **A car was broken into** last week in Gracedieu Road. The car was parked securely but still broken into and a quantity of heavy tools, including a pressure washer and generator, stolen. Police have

appealed for information.

Several cats were poisoned on Melrose Road. Police appealed for information to find the culprit but we understand that this has happened for the last 3 years in September/October and it is wondered whether someone puts something on their garden at this time of year which is

poisonous. After working with the RSPCA and doing a press release in the papers, no one came forward with any information for Police to follow up. This investigation was closed pending any further information coming to light.

Someone removed part of the **de Lisle fencing** to the hardstanding on Turlough Road. The de Lisle family was informed, and we also told the police but this did not appear in their crime statistics as above.

Just for your information Constable James Broomfield undertook some work with the BBC1 **Break-fast Time** crew on 22 October to film a piece about Anti Social Behaviour issues in preparation for ACPO National ASB week. This was broadcast on Monday 28th October 2013 around 6.20am, 7.20am and 8.20am.

Gardening and environment

- We are continuing to report various incidences of **fly tipping** around the village which is then dealt with eventually by NWLDC. Someone regularly leaves an empty 1.5 litre bottle of Lambrini in **St Andrew's churchyard**, and lately there have also been used nappies found there also which have been removed. This month we have also removed 30 cancer clothing collection charity bags which had been dumped in the middle of the pavement on **Main Street** and reported this to the charity concerned.
- If anybody is interested in **an allotment**, we understand there are some places available on the Walker Flats site behind George Street/Hall Lane. Please contact NWLDC direct if you have an interest.
- We understand that there are new rules in place which mean it is your responsibility to check that **scrap merchants** you give your things to have the necessary licenses from NWLDC and the Environment Agency. Those that do not have these licenses may dump things they are unable to sell, thus adding to fly tipping issues.

Any other business

- The winter edition of The Bauble is ready for people to deliver during November if possible please.
- Bernard left a lot of tomato and sweet pea seeds for the group, which were divided up.
