## MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON 5 MARCH 2015 AT THRINGSTONE COMMUNITY CENTRE

#### **Discussions/Decisions**

**Monthly litter total for February** – Having made an attempt to clear the area between The Bull's Head and Grace Dieu ruins of litter this month, which made the area slightly better although not a great deal as we couldn't clear it all, we have removed a total of 149 bags. This compares to 140 for February last year. Our total this month included picking up 2 electric blankets which were dumped in Grace Dieu Woods.

**Keep Britain Tidy Awards** – Very proud to say that we won the **Big Tidy Up Award for 2015**. It was a very nice event to attend in Liverpool with people like Kirstie Allsop there and Dan Rogerson, a government minister, and exceptionally emotional to collect the award and certificate. Thank you to everybody who, over the last 10 years of our existence, has helped us litter pick and keep the village looking nice and to all the members who emailed their congratulations and to the people who stopped us in the street and said thanks. We also received a well done from Andrew Bridgen MP and were mentioned at a full meeting of NWLDC.

**Next community litter pick** – 7 March at 10am from The Green. All welcome. Equipment provided.

**Summer Event** – The event previously known as Thringstone Live For Charity is moving to the Community Centre this summer with an event on 1<sup>st</sup> August and will kick off at 12 noon. It is hoped that the event will now be a full village event, with stalls etc., and a full range of vocal acts. More details nearer the time, but all proceeds go to the community centre.

**Picnic in the Parks in Coalville –** There was considerable discussion around whether we should do a bric a brac stall again this year. As we don't need extra funds for any particular project, it was agreed that we take up the provisional offer of having a history



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display in the WW1 tent, and probably just sell our publications. We could consider having a stall doing wine and water at the Whitwick Party in the Parks in September.

**The Big Lunch** – This is a national community idea, where people get together for a meal on the first Sunday in June. We also put something on the Leicestershire Villages website page for Thringstone. Hermitage FM did a full slot on the award, and there was an article in the Coalville Times of 20 February. The Vine Magazine asked for more



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information for an article, as did Village Connect and Coalville Eye. This was supplied as requested. The Loughborough Echo printed details of our award in their 1<sup>st</sup> March online posts and it went onto the Zilch (litter action) facebook page as a news story. As a result of winning this award, we have also altered the footers to our letterhead and minute templates.

## History report

- **Police houses** We have spoken to Terry Weston and Bill Kent about their time in the police and living in the village, and found out a lot about other police people who lived in the houses on St Andrew's Close which has added to our information archive. We also have more information on the old police house at 53 Loughborough Road.
- We found an insolvency notice in a Warwickshire paper dated 1832 relating to **Robert Cox**, grocer, victualler, pig, cow and horse keeper of Thringstone. Further research shows him at The New Inn, Peggs Green in the 1820s.
- We had a conversation with a gentleman who used to stay at **Warren Cottage** during the war at holiday periods. He now lives in Northamptonshire, and gave us an incite into things during the time of the Westgates.
- Ann had been to see the new owners of **Primrose Cottage** in Main Street and provided them with some history and details of a member of Ann's family who was born there.
- Following an appeal in The Bauble, we received two photos of children in their special tee shirts taken at the **Jubilee Party in 1977** at the Community Centre. These have now been scanned and put into our archives, and shared with the centre.
- A photo found on line showed **young men** in the 1950s including Jimmy Musson who lived at The Fox. This has been copied for our archives. Others on the photo were Lennie Costelow, Derek Illsley whose parents were the last landlord and landlady at The Fountain in Coalville (where the library now stands) and Pete Watts.

## Councillors' report

No report was supplied.

The meeting heard that NWLDC had received some funding from the National Forest which resulted in 80 trees being available to plant throughout the district. 5 of these have been planted on the Woodside Estate in Thringstone – two on Melrose Road and 3 on Dalkeith Walk. The meeting showed concern as to whether these trees would stay where they were planted, given that much of the FoT planting, and some of the fruit trees planted by the council in the new plantation part of Grace Dieu Woods, had been dug up to go in people's gardens.

## Police Report for last 31 days (PCSO Mark Ball)

12 Feb - damage caused to a moped on Talbot Street which was pushed over



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There was a strange incident that occurred - 2 persons walking down the road were approached by someone they didn't know. The male from the couple quickly said " ok mate" and the person passed them only to then turn around and hit the male from the couple and then run off. The meeting heard that there had been an accident on 3 March at the junction of Melrose Road and Loughborough Road (Henson's Lane end) which resulted in the back of a car being seriously damaged by another car which rammed into it. The person whose car was hit was a lady who sustained minor back injuries, and her baby was unharmed. The culprits were, allegedly, joy riding and later abandoned the vehicle on Booth Road. The debris left after the police came was put into a pile on the grass verge. NWLDC are hopeful of being able to remove this by the end of the week, along with other flytipping previously reported to them on the Woodside Estate.

## Gardening and environment

- Bernard bought more **shrubs** for the owner of the land adjacent to the Bob's Closs walkway to continue to fill in gaps by his new fencing for which he was paid. Having planted these, the owner of the adjacent land has suggested more planting in the overgrown area near his fencing on Drury Lane, which will further protect his property. Bernard will need to rake this area over, try to remove some of the stones there, and it could take a lot of planting.
- Bernard has planted **seasonal plants** on The Green and also put in more shrubs down Drury Lane to fill in gaps. More plants are needed for down by the church wall. Some planted there last year had been stolen.

# AOB

- The **Vista Mobile bus** is coming to the community centre on Tuesday 14 April from 10am 12 noon. Vista is a charity that seeks to improve the lives of people with sight loss in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. This is one of the first visits this bus will make and they will be there to promote awareness of the early signs and symptoms of sight loss.
- Our member Roy Hill has been a Trustee of Vista for some years and to 'celebrate' a milestone birthday will be running a **10k Easter Bunny run**, on 19 April, that involves 2 circuits of Beacon Hill. Roy has not run seriously, if at all, since he was a young teenager and so this is proving a bit of a challenge, but if not it would not be worth doing. He is aiming to 4 things:
  - 1. To raise £1000
  - 2. To finish the run
  - 3. Not to finish last

4. To complete the course in under an hour
