# WHAT WE ARE DOING NOW

We've been busy recently, and here are just some of the things we have done since our last newsletter in April.

- Thanks to partnership working, we have completely restored Drury Lane as an access point to Bob's Closs, and are presently working on getting the signage back for this important historical area.
- We have carried out our 6<sup>th</sup> litter pick, and cleared the village and surrounding woodland of several tons of litter.
- Several members of our group have worked with the community centre on their annual hayrake, and also worked with Friends of Gracedieu on landscape maintenance work at the Priory.
- We are also working with the council on getting the signage back for

Bauble Yard, an area off Main Street where the bauble or spar industry was run for several years in the 1800s.

- We have started work on getting a history trail walks leaflet produced for the village and are applying for funding for this.
- We've slightly revised our constitution, giving us broader areas to work towards in the hope that these will further improve Thringstone for residents and visitors alike.
- We had a stand at Picnic in the Parks, the flagship event for NW Leicestershire District Council, and through plant and bric a brac sales raised enough money to complete some of our projects.

As part of our history project, we want to hold taped conversations with older villagers, talking about their memories of Thringstone. Some of these have already been done, but there's so much more to do. After taping, we would like to have these tapes available on MP3 in the future, with sound bites on our website, so that people can buy and access them. We also want to have them transcribed to written form, as we hope that local schools, including Thringstone County Primary, may wish to have access to them in the future as part of any history project they undertake.

If you would like to help with this aspect of our project, please contact us, as we would love to hear from you.

We've already discovered that, like many villages, Thringstone used to have a maypole, heard many tales of life in the village during the war years, found out about evacuees and prisoners of war working on local farms and listened to many stories of life as a villager.

All this history will be lost to future generations unless it is recorded. Please help us with this if you can.
