Welcome to our third newsletter of 2010, produced and delivered free of charge to residents of Thringstone, by Friends of Thringstone.

Where does all our money go? That's probably a question we all ask from time to time, and Friends of Thringstone is no different, which is why we continue to look for sponsorship, when we can, to fund projects.

Membership money goes part way to fund the production of these newsletters for the village. We also keep a small reserve to reprint our existing brochures, which are detailed below. We continue to stock brochures because we want to ensure that details of our village history carry on being properly recorded and available. Having brochures on the village's past also encourages people who come to the village to take an interest, walk round the area and hopefully spend money in the village.

Each year, we produce a 'wish list' of things we would like to do, and are currently working our way through this year's. However, if you have any suggestions on improvements that you feel could be made to the village, please let us know. If we are able to help, we will do so, even if it is only to ask other agencies to get involved.

We all love where we live, and want to see the village clean, tidy and be somewhere to be proud of living.

# What are we currently doing?

- We have worked on our new flowerbed on The Green and planted summer planting and shrubs. This area will be further transformed in due course with other planting which we hope will add colour throughout the year. The Chapel Fitness Centre sponsored the re-turfing around the new flowerbed. Thanks go to them.
- We are continuing to maintain, and replant where necessary, the other areas we initially planted and are responsible for in the village. These are the bottom of Brook Lane, by the church wall, down Drury Lane, at the bottom of Millbank and on Main Street, and the bushes on Loughborough Road by the Springfield estate, and we hope to add seasonal planting where we can. Following the theft of plants from the church wall area, our group will have to purchase new shrubs, which if replaced

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with what was stolen will cost us  $\pounds$ 96. There has also been a tree to replace which did not survive the winter.

- We have purchased a number of litter pick sticks, gloves and bags so that we have enough equipment to run our litter picks as events. We had a litter pick on 12<sup>th</sup> June and worked with the national Geocache network on this. 21 volunteers collected 39 bags of rubbish and various other items for which we thank them. Our next litter pick is on 30<sup>th</sup> October and will tie in with the Community Service Volunteers action week and hopefully with local youngsters.
- We are still hoping to work with the church on conserving the grave of Charles Booth and also want to provide an artefacts cabinet at the Community Centre where historical items found in the village can go on display. Currently, anything found goes to Leicestershire museums, and does not stay in the village for local people to see.
- We are working towards putting together a small booklet on the notable graves at St Andrew's. There are a lot of interesting stories relating to people who have been part of the village's history, and we want to preserve these records for the future.
- We have been approached by East Midlands Oral History Archive to work with them on a project to record the history of the people who came to this village from Scotland and other places as a result of mining and associated industries. These stories will hopefully form part of a larger East Midlands project
- We have taken part in the Picnic in the Parks and Grace Dieu Priory summer events to further promote our village as a nice place to visit and in which to live.
- We have joined the Green Community Network set up by the district council and spoken at a council meeting about the work we do, which is seen to be part of the current government's Big Society, where local people are encouraged to work to improve their local area.

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- We are working on a general video of the village to highlight its history, and show the village and woodlands through the seasons.
- Next year is the Community Centre's centenary, and we want to work with them on a huge village event, and also on another event possibly later this year. Watch this space!
- Walks continue to be popular. We successfully took part in the National Forest walks festival and look forward to taking part in the Leicestershire walking festival in September. Our walks are 5<sup>th</sup> September at 10.30am from The Green, where you can join us for the Osgathorpe to Cloud Hill walk, and 12<sup>th</sup> September, which is our historical Grace Dieu woods, Charnwood Forest Railway and Charnwood Canal walk. Meet at The Green at 2pm. All walks cost £2.
